Advent, the season of anticipation and preparation that precedes Christmas, starts on the fourth Sunday before December 25. Christmas Day, the festival day of the birth of Jesus, falls on December 25. White, the color of the season, is appropriately used from Christmas Eve through at least the first Sunday of Epiphany. This is a season of joyful celebration.

day of the season of Epiphany. It MAY be used up through the end of the Epiphany season, which is the last Sunday before Lent.

Lent, a penitential examination, prayer, Ash Wednesday and excluding Sundays. The Lenten season points to the spring of the year and to the increasing daylight hours which spring brings. The color of the season of Lent, beginning with Ash Wednesday and including Sundays, is purple. Holy Week, beginning with Palm Sunday, marks the final week of Lent. Maundy Thurs-

right before Easter Sunday. In observance of the crucifixion of Christ, the color is black. or

no vestments at all. Easter Sunday celebrates the resurrection of Jesus and the color for it is white.

Pentecost, the fiftieth day after Easter, closes the Easter season. It is the birthday of the church. The color for Pentecost is red in vivid commemoration of the tongues of fire described in Acts 2.

Ordinary Time runs from after Pentecost until the end of the Church year, and the New Year at Advent. The appropriate color for Ordinary Time is green, and stands for the growth of the Church.


Volunteer Opportunities at The Lebanon Valley Home

From Robin's Nest to Yours By: Robin L. Getz



I must admit that where 2012 is concerned it truly is hard to believe all of the changes we have seen over the last year. The really obvious ones are the need to fill the pulpit with a good fit for our congregation. The change of a secretary and the change with our cleaning crew here at the church. 2012 was the largest loss of family, members and friends that we have celebrated in a very long time. And yes, that is one thing we do not need to repeat.

I am looking at the changes around us. The difficulty of watching our neighboring homesteads razed. I recognize that turmoil when I too watched my own childhood home demolished for more modern living. Truthfully making the sale is a difficult enough separation, but even when you sign that bottom line I do not believe anyone ever thinks that someday it will be gone. And now the not so noticeable part of this whole thing is how this event compares to us as well. Look at those solid stone foundations which also symbolized the rocks of our foundation in how our life was formed. Those large wooden beams that served as the walls and how they symbolize the same strength we see during our own upbringing with God in our life. Those roofs that offered so much protection during the wind and rain and how the clarity of our minds where God is concerned offers us the same thing.

How many storms have blown through Fredericksburg over the past 200 years and how much damage has happened to those homes that have stood for so long? Especially if we compare it to all of the news reports that show miles of brand new development that has been absolutely destroyed by severe storms. Look at the floods and winds and rains and hurricanes that we have experienced over the past few years. I still continue to be thankful that so far neither red skies nor the invasion of locusts have been included to date. And then think about everything we have gone through in our own lifetime and then understand that we too have survived the howling winds of change, the crashing thunder of challenge and the flashing lightning of understanding. We have had adversity thrown at us like large hail balls and somehow survived. We may have slipped every now and again as we would on a snow covered road. but we have continued safely on the paths chosen for each one of us.

I must admit that I sadly am one of those who have taken to watching HGTV more than I care to admit. One of the shows that are on regularly is where they have taken three homes and three families for this, I suppose, reality based program. Each home, for whatever reason is being bought and/or sold. The storyline explains a little about each family why they are moving and shows them going through the process of critiquing the home they hope to buy and how it is so not their style. Then they show the move and the changes they make to suit their



personality and then the final twist is they go back to see their old home. The current or prior owners, as the case might be, are watching their reaction in another location. Sometimes the reaction is funny, or cruel or even sad, especially in cases where their child's room is completely converted to another use. But eventually they get it. They understand that it is not the room that has necessarily made their memories but the events of the child that is starting new memories in a new room. In some cases there is sometimes emotion that I will liken to envy as they could not believe they had not thought of a particular idea and loved the transformation.

So I guess just as with this show we too must take ourselves as the subject of change and understand that some things will always be good transformations while others might not be exactly what we want, so we need to be willing to spend the time and be willing to make the investment to make ourselves exactly what we want. If that means picking up our Bible and reading to set the design plan, then that is what we must do. Our conviction to make ourselves more open to God's word and do his work is the fresh paint we will add to the walls. And our commitment to love one another just as He loves us will be the fuel in our furnace

So don't let us become so complacent we are willing to be happy to be the garage. Let us get up and promise that as with the start of every New Year we will do our best to be better and whatever our goal is. We can accomplish anything with God's love and the trust and faith of each other!
