There's an old saying: "If it sounds too good to be true, then it probably isn't true." There are some things that are so farfetched that their veracity is questioned at every turn.

A few Thursdays ago, I was watching 20/20 on ABC. One of their seqments devoted itself to one of the current fads: detoxification of body. The segment's specific focus was on a brand of Detox Foot Pads. For \$19.99 you can purchase a two-week supply that is guaranteed to rid your body of all those horrible toxins. All you have to do is put a pad on the bottom of each foot when you go to bed and the next morning remove them to discover, with sight and smell, all those toxins that deplete your body of necessary energy. Improve your health and wellness for only \$19.99, plus shipping and handling.

But wait! There's more. As an extra bonus for

purchasing the Detox Foot Pads, vou'll receive, at no additional cost, a set of Detox Eye Patches designed to remove the appearance of dark circles, crow's feet, and puffy eyes. 20/20 did their usual investigation and interviewed some folks who tried the footpads only to discover there was no change in the way they felt. It's just one of those things that seem too good to be true and in all likelihood is not true.

There are many "seems too good to be true" things in life. Those "seems too good to be true" things have been around forever I suppose. It is possible to detect them even in the resurrection of Jesus from the Have you dead. ever thought about resurrection being something that seems too good to be true?

In Acts 1 there is a hint it was. Please hear these words from verses 1-5. "In the first book,

Theophilus, I wrote about all that Jesus did and taught from the beginning until the day when he was taken up to heaven, after giving instructions through the Holy Spirit to the apostles whom he had chosen. After his suffering he presented himself alive

to them by many convincing proofs, appearing to them during forty days and speaking about the kingdom of God. While staying with them, he ordered them not to leave Jerusalem, but to wait there for the promise of the Father. 'This,' he said, 'is what you have heard from me; for John baptized with water, but you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit not many days from now."

Luke, the author of these words, addressed them to a certain "Theophilus." We are first introduced to

Theophilus in Luke 1. Theophilus is a Greek name meaning "lover of God" or "dear one to God." Scholars aren't sure who he was. He may have been a benefactor sponsoring the publication of both volumes, the Gospel of Luke and Acts. Or Theophilus may have simply been a symbolic name for any Christ-follower who would read these words. Perhaps you and I, and every other saint, are

Theophilus - lovers of God and ones who are dear to God. Surely we are. Luke wrote about everything Jesus did from the beginning of His public ministry until His glorious ascension. That formal accounting is found in Luke 3:21-24:53.

At the time of the writing of this article, we have had our reorganization meeting of the members. Continuing as president will be Robin L. Getz, vice-president will be Wendy Dorsey and Treasurer will be Walter Bolles. Although we considered naming Robin Gingrich as our secretary (she was absent with the flu) we decided to wait until our next meeting to officially name the secretary. Missy Seltzer has been kind enough to volunteer in this role until that final vote has taken place.

As promised in the last news, Pastor Herb has started his time at the pulpit with a wonderful message of how we are all called to share our talents regardless how good we think they are. Just the week before, consistory reached out to the congregation for the first time, following the U.C.C. Conference guidelines, by letting you, the members, select those that will serve on the search committee. There is one name I am waiting to confirm, but I can share who has agreed so far to serve at your request: Wendy Dorsey, Robin Getz, Neal Grimes, Terry Knapp, Bob Seltzer and Louise Walmer. As soon as we secure the seventh name we will begin meeting to develop the outline of the process to be followed. I am certain that we will again reach out to the members with specific questions related to our church needs. So stay tuned...

We are waiting for the new doors to be installed in the sanctuary. Building and grounds has done a wonderful job of keeping them on target with friendly reminders. They too have done a wonderful job of keeping our building in good repair. The basement work is again underway and should shortly be completed.

Another difficult decision we made was related to the mailing of the VOICE. We had a bulk mailing permit that was set to expire in February and were also made aware that the parcel rates would be increasing again as well so we needed to weigh our options. I must share that we are no longer able to mail from the Fredericksburg post office with this permit, so all of the parcels needed to be pre-sorted to the Lebanon Post Office bulk permit requirements and delivered to the Lebanon Post office for mailing. We are also required to mail not less than 200 pieces to meet the permit standards, which we could only accomplish by mailing on average 20 per month back to the church. I believe you will all see that just does not make good sense. So in order to receive the VOICE, moving forward, it will be made available each month on our website at <a href="http://www.stjohnsuccfburg.org/thevoice/">http://www.stjohnsuccfburg.org/thevoice/</a> or copies will be printed and available each month on the table located in the narthex for your convenience. Also, we are well aware that some do not have computer access so in those cases we must rely on a call from you or a note to the office to let us know just that. We will mail those pieces with a standard first class stamp.

Looking forward two other items that were considered was a request for St. John's to consider hosting the next Thanksgiving morning breakfast. We agreed that would be a wonderful opportunity for us; however we also acknowledged that we would be hard pressed to handle more than 80 comfortably. Stay tuned for more on this event. The second item was related to considering another intergenerational education opportunity. It was suggested that we engage our youth of all ages by having them sponsor a seed pack and we would till a garden on our grounds. Each week they would help plant, weed, and water and harvest their crop. The adults could help with the teaching of how do get their seed from the ground to the table. We will be looking for some feedback on this idea as well. So please speak with me or any of the consistory members if you have any questions.

Another big item is we voted to purchase and install and ultimately begin the training necessary to operate our first AED device. It will be centrally located and visible to all. Hopefully we will not need it, but it is good to know it is available if it is needed. This was a great way for us to celebrate heart month. Envelopes will be made available for anyone who wishes to contribute.

We continue to work hard to keep our church as loved and necessary as it always has been. You are the people who make it what it is. You give it life and offer it breath to sustain our Christian lives. May we always continue to do this work together as one in the body of Christ.

March has arrived! Can we all hope that the cold will soon disappear and the flowers will bloom and the renewal of our surroundings will again begin their annual pilgrimage of yet one more season? Spring.... What a beautiful time of the year!



I guess, in view of the spring season in our horizon, I do not need to remind you that the Easter season is upon us or to remind you of how much preparation for the season that we need to do. Not only

will our church go through the transformation of our church season, but we must understand that we too must prepare ourselves as well individually. I know that in the past I have often written about how much this season continually opens my ears, my eyes and especially my heart. The crucifixion of our Lord and Savior is almost more than I can bear. And I am also discovering this is especially true as I get older each year and as things around me change. I am also very aware of the many people I have loved that have since passed that this feeling is only heightened each year.

Lent for me has always been the season of reflection. Many questions always come to mind, especially where my spiritual journey is concerned. I can go back many years and still question some things of the past and continue to wonder why they happened. Constantly I am learning of things that not only change in the right here and now but are also not just necessary but a requirement of Christian life. I remind myself that if I am not ready to grow with what I learn then where will my final destination be?

When you refer to a newborn, it is not uncommon to hear that they are like a sponge. Constantly learning, absorbing everything around them and growing. Before you know it, they recognize you, they begin to coo, a word or two begins to pass through their lips and that very first step is unforgettable. That too is how the work of God should be with each of us. I mean, after all, do we not rely on Him to heal us when we are broken? Do we not ask for forgiveness when we have not followed his teachings? Do we also remember to show our thankfulness for things we are certain He has given to us?

What I share with you now is what I read in the 1 Corinthians chapter 2 which tells us how is it that we speak of wisdom among them that are perfect: yet not the wisdom of this world, nor of the princes of this world, that come for no reason. But we speak of the wisdom of God in a mystery, even the hidden wisdom which God ordained before the world unto our glory: Which none of the princes of this world knew: for had they known it, they would not have crucified the Lord of glory. But as it is written, Eye hath not seen, nor ear heard, neither have entered into the heart of man, the things which God hath prepared for them that love him. But God did reveal to them unto us by his Spirit: for the Spirit searched for all things, yes, even the deep things of God. For what man knows the things of a man, save the spirit of man which is in him? Even so the things of God know no man, but the Spirit of God.

Again, let's think about that one line that I repeat over and over.... But as it is written, Eye hath not seen, nor ear heard, neither have entered into the heart of man, the things which God hath prepared for them that love him.

This is the verse I repeat over and over again throughout the season of Lent. Because for me throughout Maundy Thursday and especially Easter morning. I know that as a sponge I must absorb as much as I can. If I am not willing to absorb new thoughts, new perspective, new learnings I have no choice but to wring some of the less important things out of the sponge so that I am open and acceptable to the new. I must always know that I am capable of teaching only if I am open to learning. I am only prepared as one that loves Him if I am able to accept that all things are not as I believe they should be.

The Easter season is a time for a giant mirror. One that allows me to look into it and in turn shows me a true reflection of what I am. I will truly be ready to take the journey to help carry the cross or be able to wipe the blood from the brow of Jesus during his last physical journey through the streets, but I can only do that if I am also willing to do ALL things that God has called me to do.

I am His servant. I cannot pick and choose the very best jobs that there are, but must also be willing to do those that are less glamorous. I cannot be so rigid that I believe my work is only on Sunday, but must be on call and available for all of the other hours of the days and weeks. He will give me the tasks I must complete, I just need to make sure by eyes and my ears are wide open to be able to do the work that He has chosen for me to do.

Let each of us go through the Lenten season with our eyes and ears wide open. You might be amazed at what might be in store for you....

Wishing each of you and yours a wonderful Easter season.
