What is Advent? shared by R.L. Getz



Advent is a season in the Christian year that lasts for about four weeks. In our secular American celebration of Christmas, the Christmas season (or *holiday* season, ugh) begins in the weeks prior to Christmas Day. Generally, this season starts in early December, though retailers have a bad habit of beginning Christmas in November (or even October). In my rule book, you should-n't listen to Christmas music or turn on Christmas lights until after you've finished the Thanks-giving turkey . . . at the earliest. Of course outside of my immediate family, nobody follows my rules . . . especially retailers.

So Advent overlaps with what is usually thought of in American culture as the Christmas season. But its beginning and ending are well defined, and its themes are quite a bit different from what is commonly associated with secular Christmas celebrations.

The Christian season of Christmas actually begins on Christmas Eve and lasts for twelve days, ending on January 6th. The time before Christmas is Advent, *a season of preparation for Christmas*. Christians prepare for celebrating the birth of Jesus by remembering the longing of the Jews for a Messiah. In Advent, we're reminded of how much we ourselves also need a Savior, and we look forward to our Savior's second coming even as we prepare to celebrate his first coming at Christmas. The word "Advent" comes from the Latin word *adventus*, which means "coming" or "visit." It's meant to get us ready, not for a present-opening party, but for a child to be born to us, a savior-Emmanuel.

Advent doesn't get much attention compared to Christmas, though interest in Advent is growing steadily in many churches and in many Christian homes. That's not to say everybody is an "Adventophile," a lover of Advent, however. Some Protestants ignore Advent because it isn't taught in Scripture and because they associate it with Roman Catholicism. Secular culture

ignores Advent because there isn't much money to be made here. I suppose you might be able to make a few bucks selling purple and pink candles, but this isn't going to thrill most retailers.

So as we prepare the sanctuary and look at the purple and pink associated as the advent colors of season, may we all prepare our hearts and souls for the coming of the Messiah. May we do it with preven and glad

Pastor Herb's Message

Advent is the season of anticipation and preparation. from the book of Isaiah (Isaiah 11:1-10). Branching The first Sunday in Advent is the fourth Sunday before December 25. The focus of the season includes not only preparation for the anniversary of Christ's birth but also the anticipation of Christ's return at the close of history. The seasonal color, purple, announces Christ's royalty. The color blue is used sometimes symbolizing jointly royalty and hope.

Christmas is the festival day that is celebrated as the birthday of Jesus Christ. White, the color of the season is appropriately used from Christmas Eve through at least the first Sunday in Epiphany. The season is one of joyful celebration.

The above information comes from the United Church of Christ Book of Worship.

That is all valuable information, but what about the season of Advent and Christmas here at St. John's UCC?

The Advent season starts on December 1. The Advent Candle of HOPE, the first of the Advent Candles will be lit. The focus scripture will be Isaiah 2:1-5 and the sermon title will be Trusting God's Vision. We will be looking at the prophet's vision of what the new age will look like.

December 8 will see the Advent Candle of HOPE relit and the Advent Candle of *PEACE* lit for the first time. We will continue with a focus scripture Out will be the sermon title and we will discover that, even when things seem dark and sad, God can bring new life and light.

The third Sunday of Advent is December 15. After the Advent Candles of *HOPE* and *PEACE* are relit, the Advent Candle of LOVE will shine forth. Isaiah will again be the focus scripture (Isaiah 35:1-10). The sermon title will be What Highway Are We On? as we hear the vision that God has in store for us past, present, and future.

As the fourth Advent Candle, *JOY*, is lit along with the Advent Candles of HOPE, PEACE, and LOVE, our focus will be on our choir as they share with us a Christmas Cantata. Music will fill the air.

Christmas Eve will see all the Advent Candles bringing their light to our celebration and the brightest candle of all, the Christ Candle, will show us the way. Luke 2:1-20 will once again tell us the story of the birth of God's Son, Jesus.

As always, the season of Advent and Christmas will be less of a time of HOPE, PEACE, LOVE, and JOY if you are not here at St. John's UCC.

Thank you for the privilege of sharing Advent and Christmas with you.

Happy New Year!!! I guess I am really pushing the seasons now. Redner's for a meal? And how have we reacted when the lines go But does it not constantly amaze you how fast it seems that we forever and there are only a few registers open? return to another holiday season? I can see why some retailers are pushing a cover bag for the Christmas tree, because it seems like you no sooner put it away and you need it again.

There has been so much going on in our small little church that I can barely keep up with it. Still looking toward a new Shepherd to lead us, which I know will come in good time. Remain thankful for Pastor Herb and all that he and Sharon continue to share with us as well as those supply pastors who have given us a fresh breath every now and again.

So what is it we would like to talk about this month? You know....if you haven't guessed as of yet, I can have a strange outlook on things compared to most. Some complain when they cannot get a signal on their cell phone, and I look at photos from the 1930's or so and wonder how it would have been to live in that era. What would it be like to get from point A to point B on dirt roads by horse and buggy? To wear the dress that was part of that time. Can you imagine going through the day with bows, skirts and hats. To wash my hair in the rain water barrel as I am told was common practice. To make hot piping bread in a wood stove and have a hint of that smoke within. You have seen all of those historical black and whites. Some have even lived in that era, but I would not name names..... What would it be like to have access to a time capsule and go back to that time? Who today in the current generation knows what a "flapper" was? Or a zoot suit, or the Charleston or heaven forbid the unthinkable speak easy? That time was almost as bad as the Beatles or Woodstock. How difficult it was durhave as far as modern conveniences.

Ok, then how about imagining our families going back even further when entire communities began with a covered wagon. I just recently heard a story where I work in which a gentleman rode his horse to the mill to get grain. The distance was slight, only a few miles as the crow flies, but by the time he returned the Indians had killed his wife. We have all seen Little House on the Prairie or similar shows where they put their throw rugs on the wash line and banged them with a rug beater until all of the dust was gone. Everyone pretty much made their own clothes by hand. You were considered pretty wealthy if you could order a fancy premade dress from the general store. Even though the shows depicted that time as hard, with everyone working their knuckles to the bone, I think, what would it be like to go in a time capsule to spend even one week in that era. I know I would need to learn all there is to know about a flint lock if I am to protect myself when Paul would go to the mill. But I also think, how lucky are we today to see what we have seen and yet be at a place that we are? Do we think twice when we pull something off of the shelf at

Ok...since I am on a roll; let's go back to a time where you walked to get anywhere. Horses were for royalty. Your daily diet consisted of unleavened bread, olive oil, perhaps wine. Areas were hot, dry and desolate and families lived in close guarters with dirt floors and, if you were truly lucky, a roof overhead might be an option. You lived in fear if you believed in God especially when the Romans and Egyptians were in charge. You herded sheep and goats, cattle and oxen and you were thankful for all that you had. You prayed continually for someone to help you. On a daily basis you hoped for someone to calm the unrest and especially someone to return your world to balance. What despair did the Christians of that time experience? We read of King Herod and his beautiful palace of mosaic tiles and large pools and lush gardens. You read of women wearing decorative robes and gold and the poor servants beaten at any time for reasons we cannot fathom. We read of his order to have all boys under the age of two killed as that is how great his fear was at the word of the coming of a Messiah. Can we even begin to imagine what it must have been like to live during this time? In this era that is our Christian history?

Would our faith be strong enough to risk the wrath of the Romans, be it imprisonment, torture, becoming a servant or in many cases death. If we were asked to help Joseph and Mary get to Bethlehem and prepare a place for this small baby that everyone was seeking and in Herod's case to kill, would we be willing to say, here I am, let me give you a place to rest? Let me offer some food or drink or even a well-rested donkey to keep your trip safe. Close ing those days and yet how lucky are we today to have all that we your eyes and imagine living at that time in history. What would you do? Is your faith and willingness that strong that you would sacrifice yourself and your family members to help? Would you be able to spend that one week in this time capsule?

> So I guess my question for the month would be, what era would you like to time capsule yourself to see and experience firsthand and do you have the strength and the truth to make one of those Bethlehem at the time of Christ.

> As Christmas time approaches, let us all take the time to imagine all that was true at that time. Visualize the time and all that was wished and prayed for. What was imaginable and what was out of touch. How desperate God's people must have been as they waited and longed for a Messiah.

> The merriest Christmas to all and may we all remember how truly blessed we are as we decorate our trees and shop for that perfect gift and bake our annual cookies. May we never forget what our greatest gift of all was, no matter what era we lived in or visited.....


