

According to the grace of God - All that Paul had done had been by the mere favor of God. His appointment was from him; and all the skill which he had shown, and the entire agency which he had employed, had been from him. The architectural figure is here continued with some striking additions and illustrations. By the "grace of God" here, Paul probably means his apostleship to the Gentiles, which had been conferred on him by the mere favor of God, and all the wisdom, and skill, and success which he made clear in founding the church.

As a wise master-builder - Greek "Architect." The word does not imply that Paul had any pre-eminence over the people, but that he had proceeded in his work as a skillful architect, who secures first a firm foundation. Every builder begins with the foundation; and Paul had proceeded in this manner in laying first a firm foundation on which the church could grow. The word "wise" here means "skillful" or "judicious"; compare [Matthew 7:24](#).

I have laid the foundation - "What" this foundation was, he states in [1 Corinthians 3:11](#). The meaning here is, that the church at Corinth had been at first established by Paul; see [Acts 18:1](#), etc.

And another - Other teachers have communicated to the church the first elements of Christian knowledge. Others follow out this instruction, and instruct the church. The discussion here undergoes a slight change. In the former part of the chapter, "Christians" are compared to a building; here the "doctrines" which are taught in the church are compared to various parts of a building. Grotius. See similar instances of translation in [Matthew 13](#); [Mark 4](#); [John 10](#).

But let every man ... - Every man who is a professed teacher. Let him be careful what instructions he shall give to a church that has been founded by apostolic hands, and that is established on the only true foundation. This is designed to guard against false instruction and the instructions of false teachers. People should take heed what instruction they give to a church:

- (1) Because of the fact that the church belongs to God, and they should be cautious what directions they give to it;
- (2) Because it is important that Christians should not only be on the true foundation, but that they should be fully instructed in the nature of their religion, and the church should be permitted to rise in its true beauty and loveliness;
- (3) Because of the evils which result from false instruction.

Even when the foundation is firm, unpredictable evils will result from the lack of just and discriminating instruction. Error sanctifies no one. The effect of it even on the minds of true Christians is to mar their piety; to dim its luster; and to darken their minds. No Christian can enjoy religion except under the absolute shining of the word of truth; and every man, therefore, who gives false instruction, is responsible for all the darkness he causes, and for all the lack of comfort which true Christians under his teaching may experience.

(4) Every person must give an account of the nature of his instructions; and he should therefore "take heed to himself, and his doctrine" [1 Timothy 4:16](#); and preach "such" doctrine as shall bear the test of the great Day. And from this we learn, that it is important that the church should be built on the true foundation; and that it is scarcely less important that it should be built up in the knowledge of the truth. Vast evils are constantly occurring in the church for the lack of proper instruction to young converts. Many seem to feel that provided the foundation be well laid, that is all that is needed. But the grand thing which is needed at the present time, is, that those who are converted should, as soon as possible, be instructed fully in the nature of the religion which they have embraced. What would be thought of a farmer who should plant a tree, and never water or trim it; who should plant his seed, and never cultivate the grain as it springs up; who should sow his fields, and then think that all is well, and leave it to be overrun with weeds and thorns? Piety is often stunted, its early shootings blighted, its rapid growth checked, for the lack of early culture in the church. And perhaps there is no one thing in which ministers more frequently fail than in regard to the culture which ought to be bestowed upon those who are converted - especially in early life.

So let us continue to be a church of one strong and unified foundation, worshiping and learning as one united in faith.

CROP WALK by Pam Emery

On October 20, 2013, the Northern Lebanon Area CROP Walk was held at Memorial Lake State Park, raising \$5,790 to fight world and local hunger, according to local walk coordinator, Don Eby. Twenty-nine walkers representing eight area churches participated in the event, including our own Melissa Seltzer, Pam and Gary Emery, and canine walkers Gracie and Jake. The sponsorship effort from our church community totaled \$295.

CROP Hunger Walks are community-wide events sponsored by Church World Service and organized by religious groups, businesses, schools and others to raise funds to end hunger in the U.S. and around the world. Of the funds raised, seventy-five percent go to Church World Services' initiative to wipe out world hunger, and 25 percent is shared by Lebanon County Christian Ministries food bank and JOY Food Bank, Jonestown.

From Robin's Nest to Yours



I remember as a child I would sing Jingle Bells in hopes that the Christmas season would come a little quicker each year. I am not sure what to sing to fast track some warm weather!!! It has been one of the coldest winter seasons I can remember. I hope all are doing what they can to stay warm.

This first Robin's Nest for 2014 I would like to address faith, forgiveness and acceptance. The cover article that I shared this month really caused me to think. If you follow the complete lectionary, the full scripture is 1 Corinthians 3: 10-11, 16-23. Another thing that has given me a lot to think about is serving on the search committee and what that process has been and more importantly the lasting effect it has had on me and my faith journey.

When I was a child and played children's games at recess, if you messed up with the game you were playing and quickly called for a "do over", you had the opportunity to repeat the task and hopefully get it right the second time. When I was older and played golf with my husband and his uncles I quickly learned what a "Mulligan" was. In a way you were granted forgiveness and given the chance to do it again and hopefully get it right the second time around. Today as an adult, if I mess something up, where do I go for a "do over"?? I mean seriously, I can really mess something up and no one but me is around. How does that happen? So I do all that I know how to do....I close my eyes and fold my hands and pray to the heavenly God up above to consider offering me forgiveness so that I might have the opportunity to get it right the second time. To give me the wisdom and strength to be able to fix whatever I made a disaster of and to know when I can salvage what I have or if I need to start over from the very beginning.

Have you ever noticed that when you ask for forgiveness it usually includes a test of your faith? Your faith is what lets you know that it was wrong in the first place. Your faith is what drives you to soulful prayer of forgiveness. Your faith is what makes you strong

and lets you understand that all good things will be given if you truly believe. Let's look at the facts....if you did not truly believe that moving a checker three spaces or switching out cards and not following the rules when playing solitaire would be a non-issue. But our absolute faith is what places that little person behind us that will offer a "tsk, tsk, tsk when we don't follow the rules or are not truthful about what we are doing wrong. If we did not have faith, it simply would not matter, would it?

Than we look at acceptance. Forgiveness and Faith also walk hand in hand with acceptance, because after all, isn't that what we are truly looking for? God and his people to accept us for who and what we are? I remember elementary school when we had two captains and everyone stood across from them. Regardless whether it was kick ball, or baseball, or any other multitude of playground sports that our young minds could create we had that demeaning time of waiting to see if we would get picked. We all grew up with that horrible, irreconcilable stigma that stayed with you for life when being the last one standing and the captain who had to make the call still hesitated in calling your name. You just wanted to scream LOOK INSIDE!!! My Heart is big enough to win any game you may play. So I physically am the shortest, the thinnest the weakest. But did you ever think that could make me the fastest or the most agile? Did you ever think that I might have some miraculous skill that no one else has? Not the first or the second or the third pick could do what I can do and what I have to offer. But, how many times did those words pass our lips? We just put our head down, kicked some dirt with our toe and waited those painful seconds to hear your name get called as the last one standing. I remember the captain calling someone else who was playing in another area and not even wanting to play our game being called and offered the position over you, the one who is still waiting to play.

That my friends is what I think of

when I think of acceptance, or the lack thereof. That feeling that I developed when my peers and friends judged and dismissed me. That sense of loss and worthlessness when it was clear that the school janitor looked like a better candidate for dodge ball than what I did. When we have lost our faith to the degree that we cannot accept what someone has to offer. That we cannot recognize the gifts they have to give and that we cannot look beyond the window dress of a person to see the heart of gold that beats within.

All things we know....our church, our denomination and our faith clearly outline our commitment to be accepting of all people. But do we truly accept? Are we always willing to peel through those layers and discover the gift that is standing before us? If not, than we must close our eyes and clasp our hands and ask our heavenly Father above for forgiveness. Our "do over" or "Mulligan" is not having enough faith to understand and accept those that God has sent to us to share with us the talents that He has given to them.

So when you have that next opportunity to make the call as the captain of the team, remember my story of acceptance. I urge you to remember my prayer of forgiveness and I prayerfully wish each of you the absolute Faith to know the difference of what God has given to you as long as you are willing to accept it.

Dear Heavenly Father, there are days when I feel like the lost soul waiting longer than life itself to be given just that once in a lifetime opportunity to show that there is more to me than what you see. Offer those who do not recognize my gift forgiveness for their Faith is perhaps a bit weaker than it should be. No matter what they think of my small stature, let them hear the beating of my large heart. Allow me to cross the line and be part of that team and allow them to recognize I am worth their acceptance. In Your glorious name I will always pray.....Amen!
